#### **Gunnera - Taking on Invasive Species**

Our small local team has been working hard all summer, using herbicides to control the widespread gunnera, an invasive plant, in the area from Upper Barvas to Skigersta moor. We've treated as many plants as we could reach, but some hidden in crofts, grazing lands, and moorlands may have been missed. The plants on cliffs, which need a specialist with ropes to reach, will be tackled next summer. Also, a few plants might survive the treatment and regrow. We plan to return next summer to spray these again.

#### Good news from RSPB

Our partners, RSPB have reported that Corncrake numbers on Galson Estate this summer have improved significantly. There are likely to be many reasons for this increase however, the uptake from crofters signing up to the corncrake initiative will have been a huge contributing factor. Thanks to the scheme, there is more crofting activity taking place on the estate proving that crofting and conservation can complement each other effectively.

#### **Deer Management**

The deer stalking season is well underway with shooting taking place throughout the summer and autumn. The most sensitive time for deer management is the stag season which runs from 1 July to 20 October, but most stalking takes place from August onwards. Ensuring sustainable deer management is a top priority for us so we are working closely with our sporting syndicates who are concentrating on many areas where the deer are causing a mischief, including along the road between Galson and South Dell. Our goal is to maintain a healthy deer population at a level that preserves habitats, while also considering public health and crofting interests. Shooting deer on open moorland like we have on Galson Estate is a challenge and we are grateful to our volunteers for all their time, commitment and hard work.

### Loch Stiapabhat

Due to the avian flu outbreak, the annual habitat management session (strimming the long summer grass around the hide and the loch) did not take place at Loch Stiapabhat. However, Sweeny's cows are currently munching their way through the grass at present and the loch area will still be in fine condition for welcoming the migrating birds next spring.

## **COST OF LIVING SUPPORT**

Due to the successful uptake of subsidised extra curricular activities, children and young people living in the Galson Estate Trust area can continue to enjoy these activities for just £1!

We want to express our thanks to the activity providers who have chosen to take part in this initiative: Sporsnis, Taigh Dhonnchaidh, Clan MacQuarrie Community Centre, Rocksolid and CnaG Iar Thuath Leòdhais

The subsidised activities will continue until April 2024, after which we will review the scheme again.



As winter approaches, we are once again focusing on ways to assist our community during the cold months.

This year, we plan to distribute heated blankets to anyone in our community over the age of 75. Based on feedback from last year, these blankets helped reduce heating expenses and provided warmth and comfort.

We're also continuing to subsidise the Comunn Eachdraidh Nis over sixties lunches, starting from 23rd November. For just £2, you can enjoy a warm soup, a sandwich, and homemade baked goods, either delivered to your home or available at the day club.

Additionally, we're committed to exploring more ways to help the community save on their energy costs.



We aim to fund a diverse range of community projects, focusing on skills development, health improvement, poverty relief, environmental conservation, citizen engagement, promotion of local heritage and culture, and growth in industry sectors.





## The Hebridean Community Garden

Autumn 2023 has been a fruitful time at The Hebridean Community Garden, with plenty of new projects coming to life. The madness of summer – a near constant experience of watering, sowing and transplanting – has been replaced with a more subdued sense of the growing year winding down.

Over the course of October, we ran a set of workshops at the garden on different themes that we devised in collaboration with the community – perennials and grasses; planting wind-proof trees and overwintering vegetables. These were well attended, and we had a great time in sharing knowledge and experience on these subjects with like-minded friends. We also ran our regular Ploigh session during the school holidays. The children had a joyous time in planting colourful pots full of hyacinth, snowdrop, narcissus and tulip bulbs.

The physical garden itself continues to grow and expand. Our newly positioned wheelchair accessible raised beds will allow us to reach new demographics and ensure that we are as inclusive as possible in designing and maintaining the space. Our new compost bay is now operational, ensuring that we are meeting our sustainable needs and reducing our garden waste to a minimum.

There is still lots growing at the garden, especially in the polycrubs. These wonderful designs allow island gardeners to extend the seasons and grow more exotic species that otherwise would have no hope this far north and west. Citrus fruits I know are a popular place for experimenting in our community polycrubs. We were fortunate enough to receive a visit from one of our biggest funders recently – the National Lottery. We gave Dougie a tour of our many facilitates and talked about new developments and the different ways that this community garden benefits the community.

From 2024, The Hebridean Community Garden will be transferred fully to Clan MacQuarrie Community Centre and I know they have lots of exciting plans for taking the project forward.

We would like to extend our thanks to Christopher for his commitment to this successful project . We wish him all the best for the future in his new role.
